E.I.D.X.A. MINUTES 4-12-85

Pres. KØVZR called the meeting to order at 7:47 p.m.

Treas. report and minutes were read. Motion to accept KØCF and 2nd by KØSM.

KØVM had nothing new to report on the repeater.

WØEJ reported on the hot 100 list and how the list is determined.

WØSR gave a report on DXAC activity. New vote to be taken on Pribilofs. 4U1VIC status may hinge on a 3rd party agreement. A vote was to be taken on the "Locher Doctrine" which allows for country status consideration of any proposed new one only once every two years. TT8CW is good for credit but not the F6 that operated portable Chad. The 5X5 operation has no documentation.

KØCF reported he is trying to get a price quote for 1000 QSLs for those who would be interested in that quantity.

W4NIM displayed the plaque for KØLUZ and NBØH was going to arrange for engraving.

NGØW gave a report on Field Day plans to operate from North Dakota.

WØEJ expressed his thanks to his contest team for their efforts in the ARRL DX Phone test.

KØVZR discussed net activity for the summer. It was decided to continue calling net throughout the summer with a motion by WØEJ and second by WØIZ.

WØEJ reported receiving an invitation from WBØOET Pres. of CVARC for our club to join them June 9, 1985 at Jones Park for a picnic.

KFØZ reported WDØBHR was coordinating a call book group buy.

KZØC and KDØHY reported that they are QSL managers for KP4BZ and NP4CC.

WØWP reported the special beer and pizza meetings for contest planning went over well.

KØVZR opened for summer meeting plans. W4NIM moved to have a picnic for the July meeting at his house. 2nd by WØEJ. KØVZR and W4NIM to arrange date.

W4NIM reported he is looking for a volunteer for a scouting canoe trip from Palisades Park to St. Louis. Several scouts are working on tickets and radios are to be taken along with the possibility of special QSLs for contacts with the group.

KØVZR discussed the request for funds by NCDXF for Clipperton expense. NØAFL moved we send \$25. with some discussion KØGVB seconded. WØWP amended the motion to pass the hat with proceeds to be sent to NCDXF. This motion passed and \$41.00 was collected.

WØVX announced the Extra Class test would be given May 25, 1985 at Kirkwood. Also May 18 Ottumwa and April 21 in Waterloo.

KØAL announced plans of a European bicycle tour with his son May 31 thru July 6th. He is arranging for licensing and plans to take his 2 mtr handheld. He is hopeful of operating some Hf as a guest op through his 2 mtr QSOs.

New members considered and accepted were: KJØH, ABØM, KØRW and WØPLS. Motion for acceptance by WØEJ, 2nd by W4NIM. Motion passed. Membership certificates were presented to KAØCEH and KEØY. NØSM played a recording of a 160m contest QSO.

PERSONALITY PROFILES

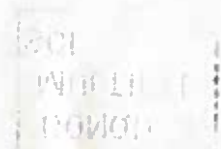
