I've been out shopping for a new DXpedition T-Shirt! No..... I'm not getting ready to go on one.... I've been on one! Or, at least it seems like it to me. Perhaps it will become my New Hobby? Changing QTH's often! Now I know what Eric, SMØAGD, felt like on his Pacific Island-Hopping expedition (sans the topless native girls, unfortunately). In July, I relocated to Ainsworth, just under the tower of Terry Cellman, WDØAWL. But, that's not unusual, because anywhere in Ainsworth is under Terry's 100 foot tower. From this location I burned large holes in the radio spectrum with my thundering 100 watts, to a dipole at 40 feet. This was quite a change from the Contest Station I had been building in Muscatine for the past ten years. But, WØIZ is my insperation. If he can "work em" QRP, so can I. And I did! Even managed to pick up an all time new country counter, (#297) in T5GG, on 20 meter CW one night... in the middle of a pile-up, no less! After a lot of QRP practice I found the contacts were coming too easily. I never thought it would happen... but alas.... too much DX! Too easy!! Don't even need the Kilo-watt and Beams!!! Time to hop to my "next island", I thought. So, during the first weekend of October I relocate my QTH to Washington, Iowa.

I'm going to really have some fun at this QTH! It's got a nice small yard.... no towers allowed.... strategically surrounded by lots of neighbors with ancient television antennas on their roofs, (should provide excellent rectification characteristics). I have now graduated to QRPp (in my book). FORCING MY ENTIRE 100watts

now graduated to QRPp (in my book). FORCING MY ENTIRE 100watts of "screaming power" into a ground mounted Butternut Vertical! I like to gaze up on the wall and look at my past Contest Award Certificates while I repeatedly send CQ's waiting for a response. I did get response once (after CQ'ing for 35 minutes). But, I don't think it counts as a valid two-way QSO. I was transmitting on the Drake Twins... but the responding neighbor was on landline, so it probably doesn't count. I couldn't get a QSL out of him anyway (and I even included an S.A.S.E. with greenstamp).

In truth... it really isn't that bad. In fact, it really is humbling, and fun, to operate this way for awhile. Actually, my first QSO from Washington was a YB2 on 20 CW, and the rig wasn't even grounded yet! Those were followed by a couple of ZL's and My new operating conditions have caused my Ham friends to change my "handle" on 2 meters though. Because of my callsign prefix of "KJ", I had often been referred to as "Kilowatt John". Heck... some of my buddies even accused me of having my main "ham gear" on-off switch wired directly to the Amplifier Switch. What nonsense! It was a totally seperate switch... and at least 2 or 3 inches away from the amplifier switch! Anyway, now I'm just known by my callsign suffix. KJØH ... "Humble"! But, just wait until the 160 meter contest and "Kilowatt John" may return for a brief 48 hour period. Many of you have asked, when I decided to return to my career in Broadcast Radio, "why did you take a job in Washington, Iowa? Let me tell you about KCII Radio. It is both an AM and a Fm facility. But, the AM Side is a sunrise to sunset only station. After sunset, that BIG...BEAUTIFUL... 255 FOOT TOWER just sits there, doing nothing more than support its flashing red lights, and maintain a steady weight on its extensive, 250 foot radius, copper-grid grounding system. Get the idea?

You E.I.D.X.A. boys continue to provide the group recognition in the contests again this year. Check page 91 of the October issue of QST, for results of the 1988 ARRL Intr. DX Contest. The Eastern Iowa DX Assoc. beat out the Kansas City DX Club! We had a nice showing, spearheaded by NØSM and WØWP. In the phone portion, Tom WØWP, took 1st place Iowa. And on CW, Steve NØSM, collared 1st place Iowa, and 1st place for the entire midwest division. And, how about my "QRP Hero", WØIZ Dale... Division Leader in the "true QRP" catagory... and placing #5 Nationally! If he keeps this up, I'll want to change QTH's again so I can make the contacts even tougher!

Looking forward to seeing you all at the fall meeting, October 21st, at the Marion R.E.C. Building. We will be selecting new officers for 1989, and a final decision will be made regarding the Club Jackets we've been discussing all year long. We'll even manage to sqeeze in a brief program and provide a "sneak peek" of the E.I.D.X.A. Slide presentation currently being compiled.





BOULDER AMATEURS ASSAULTED FROM ALL SIDES HAVE UPHILL FIGHT AGAINST ANTENNA RESTRICTIONS
AUGUST 1988

Friday, July 29th was a dark day for amateur radio. In one of the most important cases in amateur radio history, two local operators seeking exception to the Boulder County 35 foot height restriction were handed a devastating negative decision by Federal Court Judge Zita Weinshienk.

David Evans, NQOI, and Tim Holzhiemer, N6DIY, who had originally applied for 125 foot towers on their one acre parcels in rural residential Boulder County have now been denied the right to erect anything taller than 35 feet. After months of hearings before the Board of Adjustment, Planning commission, County Commissioners and finally the Federal Court, the result, is a 35 foot limit except in extraordinary circumstances. County officials have not offered, in fact have refused to negotiate, on a height for a fixed tower between 35 feet and the 125 feet originally requested.

Finding in favor of the County, Judge Weinshienk made a very narrow ruling:

- 1. It was reasonable for the county to deny 125 feet.
- 2. Because another amateur had obtained a variance, the 35 foot ordinance was reasonable. (see below)

The judge said that in her opinion PRB-1 did not apply to individual amateur operators, but only to the Amateur Radio Service in general. She determined there is not absolute prohibition of amateur radio in Boulder County. The County was not precluding amateur radio.

She said further that the County's 35 foot limit could be varied in appropriate cases and that provisions in the County's proposed ordinance for taller towers or other supporting structures satisfied her that the proposed ordinance was in compliance with PRB-1.

In making her decision, she considered Boulder's unusual panoramic view, unusual winds, safety factors and property valuation. She also said she expected this case to be appealed.

One of her concluding remarks was that there were many rural areas in Boulder county. She hoped the amateurs with tower aspirations could locate in these areas. she stated that she had no problems with any of the facts of the case as presented by the plaintiffs, but proceded to rule against them anyway.

The amateurs presented evidence which showed conclusively that the proposed towers would be completely safe, that property values would not be affected, that health factors would not be a concern, and that scenic vistas on the whole would be affected in only a very limited way for a few residents.

All the benefits and positive aspects of amateur radio were ignored except the amateur operator's capability for emergency communications. The opinion is that amateur radio is only a hobby and that 35 foot tall antennas are adequate.

Marshall Quiat, AGOX, filed and argued a strong case supported by extensive documentation. A professional property value comparison was submitted to the court showing that amateur radio towers had no adverse

effect on property values. Marshall has been assisted by Bob Neece, KOKR and Chris Imlay, N3AKD. through Bob and Chris, ARRL filed an amicus brief.

A notice of appeal was filed August 8, 1988 for an appeal hearing before the 10th Circuit Court of Appeals. Doc and Tim intend to press on, but it will be an uphill battle. the ARRL might file as a co-plaintiff.

There are two seperate issues we must be concerned about:

- 1. The Federal Court case
- 2. And the new ordinance put forth by Boulder County.

Both issues directly affect A L L amateur radio operators in Boulder county, and across the United States. We must put forth a determined and coherent effort.

To retain our right to erect effective antennas, we must take this case to the Federal Appeals Court. It is an excellent case, as ironclad as they come. So far our legal representation has been donated by Bob Neece, KØKR, and Marshall Quiat, AKØX, the ARRL Rocky Mountain Division director.

This is clearly developing into what will be an extended battle to regain our amateur privileges. There are both near and long term funding needs. At present we have an extremely important appeals court case to fund. Later there well be additional attempts by the county to modify their ordinance and continue to unreasonably restrict amateurs. It is also quite possible that we might be required to defend ourselves against suits from dissatisfied neighbors.

Such a suit was just lost by a Boulder amateur on Tuesday, August 16, 1988. Boulder District court judge Roxanne Balin ruled on the basis of the complaint filed that the amateur's towers are illegal. this amateur spent months going through the variance process before the Boulder county Board of Adjustment as directed by the boulder County Commissioners. He was granted the necessary variance and permit. The judge's ruling evidently means that the county didn't know its own laws. (The initial favorable variance decision was used by Weischienkas evidence of a "favorable" climate for amateurs in Boulder County.)

Additional funds are now desperately needed. We appeal to A L L amateurs and other interested parties to donate generously to this cause. Without adequate funds, recent court action and local ordinances might signal the demise of the Amateur Radio Service.

If every amateur share the burden of this immense task by donating \$50, \$100 or more, in installments if necessarry, we would be well on our way toward achieving our goals. A minimum of \$30,000 is neeeded at this time. The fund stands at \$2,200 today.

Also, a reminder to everyone. There is a county commissioner's election coming up. It will pay to vote for the commissioner candidate who will be most likely to treat amateur radio fairly. The ones in office do not fit this description.

The ordinance voted by the Boulder County Commissioners on June 28, 1988 follows:

Proposed amateur antennas and/or Towers:

- 1. that exceed the zone height limit (35 feet residential, 50 feet agricultural),
- 2. are closer to a boundary than a set-back equal to the height and width of the installation,
 - 3. which exceed the limit of one per lot,
 - 4. exceed 10 feet above the roof line,
 - 5. which involve "substantial" changes,

must be submitted to the Limited Impact Special Review process.

The estimated fee for the review is \$100 and up, according to complexity of the review and the expense of much paperwork, some studies and expert reports. this process is being developed for open Mining. Once a permit has been issued, and "substantial" changes to the antenna or its support require a new review and permit. the county defined "substantial" as "probably height and/or bulk".

One amateur has already inquired about a permit under the new ordinance, which is not yet law. He was told to submit TWENTY-ONE (21) seperate items of application. He must meet an additional long list of requirements, which were never mentioned by the county during the hearings.

In additional developments, we received a call from the Denver FCC office on Monday, August 15, to refer a hot RFI complaint against a Boulder amateur. According to the FCC, they are being inundated with complaints against amateurs from all over the Denver metro area. the complainants all sing the same tune: "Its only his hobby. He doesn't have to do it. I've talked with all the neighbors and we want him off the air, so we can live in peace." The same litany was heard at the various hearings in Boulder.

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Code Characters Frozen During QSOs

In a recent report on last year's DXpedition to Antarctica, the League of Radio Relaying Americans' Technical Committee on Propagation has disclosed an unusual cold weather effect on radio transmissions. According to Committee chairman, Dr. E. Flux Norgate, the DXpedition experienced temperatures below -100 degrees F. on three occasions, and each time the temperatures fell, QSOs would be interrupted for up to 30 minutes because CW characters either froze or stuck together as they left the antenna, making communication impossible. On one occasion a complete transmission's worth of CW froze solid to a radio hut trapping the occupants for 18 hours. On another occasion, the morse code was transmitted all right but stuck together so badly that the receiving station could not copy it. Thus far the LRRA has no explanation for the phenomenon.

Elmer Grunt Lectures on Early Predecessor to Morse Code

Old timer Elmer Grunt lectured on the 26-dit code system last week at the Traditionalist radio Amateur program Class 'C' license class. Grunt explained to the students that early radio operators did not immediately adopt the morse Code, but first used the 26-dit code instead for many years. In the 26-dit code, each letter of the alphabet was assigned a corresponding number of dits. That is, A=., B=.., C=..., J=....., etc. "Although popular," Grunt said, "the 26-dit code was unfortunately somewhat cumbersome". Grunt went on to tell the class how the 26-dit code was replaced by the "Dit and Space Code" in 1879. This code system was much simpler in that it required a maximum of only 13 dits to form a character. These dits were used in combination with 13 spaces which were performed in the carrier-off or key-up mode. Finally, before the turn of the century, another code system, the "No Dit, All Space Code," was briefly tried. It was the simplest of all as it required no dits. All characters were formed in the key-up mode. In fact, no key was necessary. Unforturnately, this code, while using very little spectrum space, was very difficult to copy and never gained acceptance among hams of the day. Still, now and then on straight key night, one is likely to hear an old timer like Elmer Grunt get on he air with he 26-dit code, the "Dit and Space code," or the "No Dit, All Space Code".
