BRIEFLY, I AM ON THE MEND. THE ATTACK SERVED AS A GOOD, SWIFT SLAP ON THE WRIST AND A WARNING TO GET MY ACT TOGETHER. WE HAVE DONE A LOT OF DIET CHANGES AT OUR HOUSE, PLUS I HAVE LEARNED TO EXERCISE SMART. I THINK I WILL BE BACK TO WORK SOON (MIXED BLESSING).

WHAT I AM GETTING AT IS THIS. WE ARE ALL AGING AND THE NEW ONES ARE CROPPING UP AND WE ARE GETTING THEM ALL WORKED, WITH SURPRISING REGULARITY. I FEAR SOME OF MY MANY FRIENDS MAY FADE OUT WITH THE SUN SPOTS AS THE CURRENT CHALLENGES ARE MET. PLEASE, FRIENDS, BEFORE YOU DO THIS, EXPLORE THE OPTIONS PRESENTED HERE OR CREATE YOUR OWN ORIGINAL CHALLENGES. LET ME KNOW WHAT YOU'RE UP TO, MAYBE I CAN TAG ALONG.

THE PREZ SEZ

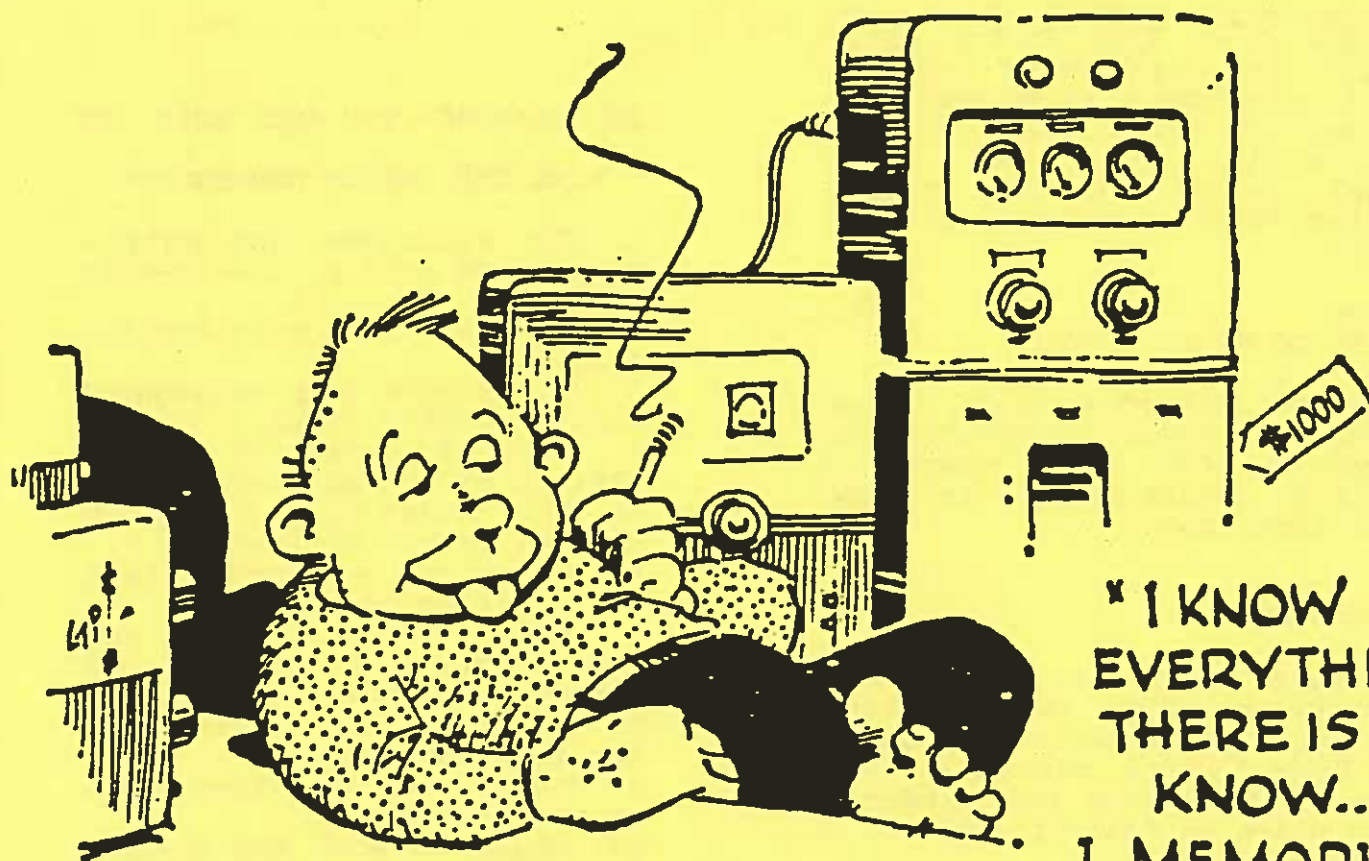

CONTEST ALERT

EIDXA QSL CARDS

APRIL 14
COMBINED SPRINT & CHESS CONTEST

Same basic format as Sprint, but stations must work other stations enough times to complete a chess game. On initial contact with a stations, exchange first moves (station calling CQ plays White), then sprint at least 5 kHz and begin game with second station, etc. Continue games by finding the stations again one at a time and exchanging one move. Score is number of games played multiplied by number of wins. Draws count half points. No Boards permitted. CW only. Brilliancy prizes.

APRIL 21
OLDE PHARTES CONTESTE

Exchange latest prescription number, days since last doctor visit and full description of current medical symptoms. Each exchange must last at least one hour. 75 meters only, use of call sign optional. Contestants must remain alive for duration of this 24-hour contest.

APRIL 28
MODIFIED CQ WW DX CONTEST

No contacts allowed with JA, YU or UA stations. Special certificates for stations with total number of contacts in double figures in spite of this limitation.

MAY 5
10-10 CONTEST

Like regular 10-10 contest, except that operator giving their numbers in "dollars and cents" are disqualified from future contests. The contest is therefore not expected to take place in following years.

At this time, only first ever DXCC applications may be checked in the field. The ARRL will likely expand that to any new DXCC application later this year. Your field checkers currently are KØVZR, NYØV, WØEJ, WØIZ, WØSR, and WB8ZRL.

VP8 SOUTH SANDWICH ISLANDS

The famous explorer Captain James Cook, in 1775, when describing Cook Island in the South Sandwich Islands, is reported to have said "This is the most awful place in the world". A little more than two centuries later, during one of the Argentine occupations of the islands, Carlos Alberto Pereyra, chief of Argentina's Corbeta Uruguay scientific station on Thule Island and the last operator of LU3ZY, probably the last amateur radio operator to be active from the South Sandwich Islands, told WA2VUY that the winds were in excess of 100 Miles per hour and that there was a period when their antennas were down for months.

"Sailing Directions" note that "Vessels should exercise caution in the approaches to these harbors...., the islands are completely surrounded by pack-ice.... during the late winter and spring..., the general weather patterns in the group are cloudy with fog or snow, and clear cloudless days are rare... and mountain summits are almost always hidden by low clouds".

SOUTH SANDWICH ISLANDS CONTINUED

The South Sandwich Islands are a group of eleven islands and rocks located in the Scotia Sea near Antarctica and about 450 miles southeast of South Georgia Island (lying between latitudes $58^{\circ}18'S$ and $50^{\circ}28'S$ and between longitudes $26^{\circ}14'W$ and $28^{\circ}11'W$). They are administered by Great Britain as a dependency of the Falkland Islands. M.W. Holdgate of the Scott Polar Research Institute explains that...ten of the islands form a curved chain of islands stretching for 190 miles north and south while the eleventh, Leskov Islands, lies to the west of the group at its northern end. The group is the only typical volcanic arc in the Antarctic region.... Several of the islands exhibit volcanic activity.

Mr. Holdgate also noted, that prior to 1962, even though the islands had numerous visitors - whalers, sealers, and patrolling warships - little was known about the scientific aspects of the islands. Before the use of the helicopter very few landings were attempted because of the almost constant swell.

The islands are barren and ice-covered, with extensive vegetation only found near areas of volcanic activity. Animal life consists mainly of birds, penguins (Chinstrap, Macaroni, Adelie and Gentoo) and some fur seals. The islands in the southern portion of the group appear to have more severe weather.

The South Sandwich Islands group is comprised of two island subgroups: in the north and central areas, the Traverse or Traversay Islands consist of Zavadovski Island (the reported location of the pirate (?) operation of 4K1ZI), Leskov Island, Visokoi Island, the Candlemas Islands (Vindication and Candlemas), Saunders Island, Montagu Island and Bristol Island. In the south the Southern Thule Islands contains three islands: Thule, Cook and Bellingshausen. Thule is important to us, because it was the location of the VP8SSI DXpedition in March, 1992.

Thule Island or Morrell as it is called by Argentina, is located at $59^{\circ}27'S$, $27^{\circ}23'W$, is, according to "Sailing Directions" mentioned before, buried beneath an ice cap, but provides the best anchorage in the South Sandwich Islands.... Thule Island is considered to be an active volcano, but it obviously provides more than the best anchorage, because it was the site of two Argentine expeditions, the last of which was ended by British troops during the Falkland Islands War. The island is essentially barren; vegetation covers only about 5 per cent of the island's surface.

The Argentine base camp on Thule is located at Ferguson Bay on a peninsula which is about 1200 meters long by 600 meters wide. One source describes Thule Island as being crescent shaped while the Russian Map series shows otherwise. The central peak of the island rises to a plateau at an elevation of about 2700 feet.

The southern Islands were first sighted by Captain Cook in 1775. Russian explorer Fabian Gottlieb Benjamin von Bellingshausen discovered the northern group of islands circa 1819. Bellingshausen proved that the islands were truly islands, a fact that Cook had thought, but not proven. The British government formally annexed the islands in 1908 and 1917. The island remained uninhabited for 200 years after being discovered. the only permanent habitation on the islands has been maintained by Argentina, despite protests from Great Britain.

HIGH CLASS WE AINT, BUT.....

Remember the article in the last EIDXer about the QCWA Radio Collection on exhibit at the Western Heritage Museum in Omaha, Nebraska?? Well, look on page 13 of the April, 1993 QST for more information and some photos. Remember, you saw it first in the EIDXer !!!

DEATH PLOT ??

An Arizona amateur has been credited with helping expose an apparent plot by two teenagers to poison a teacher and a class-mate.

Wayne Spaulding, KB7JYG, of Mesa, Arizona, east of Phoenix, overheard a cordless telephone conversation on the 46 MHz band on the evening of March 10, in which poisoning was mentioned. Spaulding taped the conversation and the next day called the police.

Police played the tape for the Mesa High School track coach, Gary Butler, who identified the two voices on the tape as those of students in his home room, one a 16 year old, the other 17 years old. Butler was apparently one of the youth's apparent target, as was a 15-year-old girl.

Police have booked both teenagers on suspicion to commit murder. Police said one of the youths had a "sizable amount" of poisonous drain cleaner with him at the time of his arrest, according to "The Arizona Republic".

Police told the newspaper that eavesdropping on cordless telephones is not illegal but implied that the reception was made on a "ham radio", when in fact Spaulding was listening to a ordinary consumer scanner radio.

The two youths are scheduled for hearings in early April to determine whether they should be tried as adults on the conspiracy charges.

Wayne Spaulding has been a licensed amateur for about two and a half years and his primary interests are on the UHF amateur bands. He and his wife Cheri, both hold Technician class licenses. Cheri is N7PHR.

Wayne Spaulding, coincidentally, works for the Mesa school system, designing and building electronic equipment to enable disabled students to use computers.

PacketCluster Notes

Some thoughts about TNC parameter settings: The following assumes that the TNC parameter AX25L2V2 is set ON to use Version 2.0. Version 2.0 has some advantages that everyone should take advantage of. Initially version 2.0 had some problems, but those have long since been fixed.

The FRACK value defines the number of seconds to wait after a transmission before trying to resend (if an acknowledgement has not been received). A value in the range of 6 or 7 seconds is good.

The TXDELAY value tells the TNC how long to pause after keydown before starting to send the digital data. The purpose is to add an extra delay for relay switching. The cluster 220 MHz value is 35 (350 milliseconds), which allows the Midland xmtr relay and the PA relay enough time to switch in. Anything longer than what is necessary to get the relays switched and will only add to the QRM on the frequency.

The CHECK parameter defines the amount of time the TNC will sit idle before it polls the other TNC to insure the connection is still there. In the Packet Cluster environment where we tend to stay connected for hours (and days) at a time, it has less need than in the 'normal' packet world. The cluster sends 2 NUL characters to each user every 11 minutes (to help those users coming in through NETROM) so there will be activity at least that often. If the CHECK parameter is set to something slightly greater than 11 minutes, then you will cut down on the channel activity and still know (within 11+ minutes) when you have been disconnected by the cluster.

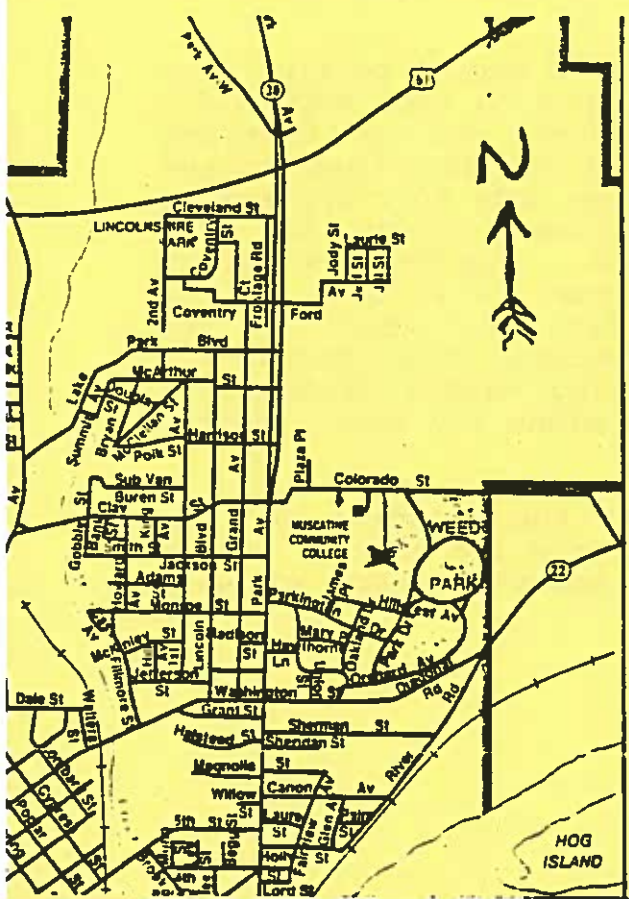
Several users have been guinea pigs for me in trying to find some parameter values to 'slow down' the responses so they spread out after an alert or poll and don't collide and end up 'retrying out'. We tried the-persistent Carrier-Sense Multiple Access (PPERSIST ON) but it seems like that applies only to responses to data packets and not to polls. What has seemed to work for WØSR is to turn PPERSIST OFF and set DWAIT high. Jim has his set up around 2 seconds. Now, all the others jump in as soon as the cluster goes key up, but Jim comes in a bit later when the freq is quiet. I end up polling the others, because they stomped all over each other. Some of you experiencing random disconnects (especially if you are close to the node) might try this. We may need to coordinate the values of DWAIT.

Getting all these parameters set so that the close-in and the far-out users can all peacefully coexist has not been a simple task. Maybe some day we will stumble on something that actually works.

Proceed south (towards McDonalds) through 4 stop lights. At the 5th light turn left onto Colorado Street. After an "S" curve you will see an elementary school on your left and Muscatine Community College on your right. As you start down the hill, take the road towards the towers behind the college (look for the EIDXA sign). Follow the road all the way to the back lot. Talk in on 146.91.
