BRIEF ON JOE RATKEINICZ, N0EL

Joe was an Erie, Pa., boy who learned code and became a ham during high school age. When WW2 broke out, the services were not accepting anyone who had only one eye (Joe lost his left eye as a teenager due to a rifle blowing up in his face) so he joined the merchant marine and was "Sparks" on MM ships during the war and several years afterward. Not being a drinking man, he got text books and studied physics during his off duty times. When in port he would look up the local professor to help him solve problems he was having. Later when he saved enough to finance himself thru college he got a degree in physics. He worked for AC Spark Plug and then for the Army. His last project with the Army Weapons Command was the development of tank laser range finders.

As an amateur, he loved to build amplifiers, teach code and theory. He was always helping the new ham with their problems. He had NR 1 award in DXCC, NAZ, 5BDDXCC, 5BNAS and others. He was a volunteer examiner from it's inception, wrote several articles for QST, loved to get in pileups, had no use for CD, spoke his mind without mincing words, and had no use for quitters.

He had two sons and two daughters and five grandchildren.

He had quite a bout with bone cancer which spread thru his whole system and never complained to the very end. We are going to miss this great guy.

A WORD FROM THE PREZ

The contest season is well underway, and several EIDXAs were heard in the CQWW contests. Conditions were much better this year for the cw contest as there was not the ice on all the antennas as was the case in 1992. Freezing rain was forecast for the weekend, but the weatherman couldn't even get that right. Forty meters was fantastic with over 100 countries heard and 37 zones known active. The contest was a good warmup for the biggest DXpedition of the new year. The rarest of the rare, Peter I, will be activated the first week of February. And the pileups will be like the VP8SSI and 3Y5X of previous years. This DXpedition will be at one of the most inhospitable places on the earth, and one of the most difficult to get to. A video of the previous trip will be shown at the club meeting. As we fight the pileups from a cozy shack, we can be thankful that it is someone else out there.

The rest of the contest season resumes this month. The CQ 160 cw contest is the 29-30 of January, and the ssb event is 27-28 February. Richard, G3WJN and Al, N9OK, are heading up an effort for these two weekends from a rented site with a grain elevator to hang antennas from. They are looking for operators for either/both of these weekends. If you have never been on 160 for lack of antennas (or room for antennas) try your hand from this station. Contact Richard via PacketCluster. February and March see the ARRL DX contests and the opportunity to work some new ones to satisfy your band/mode needs.

A number of us use CT to log during the contests. I found a 'trainer' program for CT cw users. It was written by AH0K for the JA operators that contest from AH0. It looks just like CT and 'calls' you for contest exchanges. An hour of practice before the contest will have you rearing to go when 00Z comes. It works great on my AT and XT, but the cw was way too fast on NB0H's 40MHz 486. If anyone wants a copy, please let me know and I will bring some copies to the club meeting on floppy disk.

I hope to see each of you on the 21st, and hope you enjoyed the holidays.

Tidbits

One of the things I enjoyed most about editing the Newsletter several years back was doing the column Tidbits. It gave me a chance to share some of the less newsy activities and let the forum of members know what's going on with fellow members. Of course we can only report what we hear, observe or are told, this being the case help us out by reporting what is happening.

The Linn County tower committee has been meeting on a regular basis (according to WB8ZRL) and have not settled on a set of ordinances agreeable to the county board or the hams. One of the main issues that needs to be worked out is the limiting height. The radio amateurs would agree to 200 feet and the county is saying no more than 125 feet. The height measured to the highest point of the structure. Representing the amateur community, on the county board, is Wade Walstrom W0EJ and the ham action committee includes WB8ZRL, NY0V and W0EJ. This is a very time consuming, ulcer generating bunch of meeting that require diplomatic talent to hash out the details. We certainly appreciate the guys efforts on our behalf!

Living out in the county now has afforded us with the luxury of having the space for a 160 meter inverted vee, something that was not possible in our QTH is Marion. Now sporting a TL922 Kenwood amp with a 160 meter position, I have been periodically engaging in Top Band country chasing. Knowing that K0GVB, W0EJ and KK0U have achieved DXCC on this band makes me think I can too. Glenn K0JGH and Jim KF0H have also been pile-hopping with me on 1.8 MHz. It has been a challenge to say the least but surprisingly good opening some evenings makes it well worth the time spent. Would you believe working Europe from Iowa at 6PM local was possible or logging 22 countries in CQWW CW 1993?

Speaking of Top Band N0SM and crew did another bang up job in this years CW 160 test. Annually they go head to head with NC0P and crew.

Another large tower has arose off of Tower Terrace road west of CR. W0SML, Doug has in place a KT34XA at about 80 feet. In his new QTH Doug plans to be more active and have several ideas for antenna on 160 meters. With the spacious QTH, there is plenty of opportunity to erect!

After being lightning struck this Summer, Joe W0MJN has replace several pieces of equipment in his arsenal including a new TH7DXX and a new Henry amplifier. It appears to be 'doing the job' a Joe turned a fine score in CQWW SSB test this Fall.

We say our 73s and best wishes to Brad Farrel, KD0RT, who has QSYed to Jefferson City, Mo.

K0GT reports,....(New antennas at K0GT this season) The 160 inverted V allowed a few mults in the CQWW but is lately picking up some broadcast intermod from what I think rusty hardware activity. Probably try something else next season. On 80m I have an inverted V for phone and use the HF2-V on CW. The vertical seems quieter and hears better in most comparisons. May have to rig a remote relay to switch the loading coil for phone and CW use. Also use the HF2-V on 40m. The Tuning on 40 is broad enough to cover most of the band. New this year on 40m is a Mosely 2 el beam. It is tuned for CW and is fixed on the side of the tower at 70 ft. I had hoped to be able to rotate it about 120 deg. but the elements catch on the guy wires. I can rotate it buy loosening the boom hardware and dipping the elements past the guys but it's not convenient in winter weather. So looks like if I want to get some use out of it, I will need to mount it above the top guys on a ringrotor. New for the WARC bands, I put up a Cushcraft D-3W rotary dipole at 105ft. Lastly at the top of the tower I added a new 2m Isopole for packet. I continue to use the KT34XA on 20,15 and 10 meters. Already thinking about changes for next year. I better not say anything to the XYL about that until after Christmas! de K0GT

HAMFEST REVIEW de WDOAWL

As of Oct 30, the 1993 hamfest season ended for me. Now all I have are the reflections of 93 and expectations of 94. The 93 hamfest season was a good one for me. No major purchases were made, but many smaller toys were gathered.

The hamfest season for many starts in January at Wheaton Illinois. Although I have never been to this event, hams that have gone say this is a good hamfest. It has a full compliment of activities; V.E. exams, flea mkt, commercial tables, and seminars.

The February hamfest calendar leads most Eastern Iowans to the Rock Island hamfest. Recently moved to a larger facility, the hamfest suffered in its initial new year, but has been improving with each passing year. The Rock Island hamfest lacks seminars.

March leads many Illinois hams to Sterling Ill. I have been to this hamfest once and probably won't return unless I have a terminal case of winter cabin fever. This was a very small hamfest held on a large gym floor. Save your money for Dayton.

April is the red letter month for hams. What can be said about the Dayton Hamvention? I guess I'll just say, if you haven't been there go!

May brings us the relatively new hamfest at Marshalltown. It features V.E. exams, a free tailgate area, and commercial dealers.

June starts off with one of my regular hamfests. The Starved Rock Radio Club presents their hamfest at Princeton Illinois. It features a large free outdoor flea mkt, and commercial vendors. It is easy to access as it is only 2 miles from I-80. June also features the Des Moines Radio Club hamfest. I put this one in the same category as the Sterling hamfest. Don't go unless you have other things you need to take care of in Des Moines. This hamfest will take you one hour to take in. One rule of any hamfest should be: NEVER GO TO THE HAMFEST IF IT TAKES LONGER TO GET THERE THAN IT DOES TO TAKE IN THE HAMFEST.

July seems to be the dead month in hamfests for EIDXAs. If you have been to a good hamfest in July, let me know and I will put it on my schedule.

August brings us all together at the Cedar Rapids hamfest. It is this writers opinion that this hamfest is slowly getting better. The one change I would make in this hamfest would be to eliminate the EIDX meeting from this event. Perhaps this is something we might discuss at one of our future meetings.

September opens with one of my favorite fests. It is a two day event at the Peoria Illinois Expo Gardens. I usually stay over Friday night and take in the hamfest Saturday. Having been to both days, I can say with some authority that Saturday is by far the best day to attend.

It has the largest outdoor flea market, next to Dayton. It has two large buildings for commercial exhibitors and several other buildings for speciality dealers. It features V.E. exams, forums, a Saturday night banquet, large flea mkt, commercial vendors and the best food at any hamfest I have attended.

October usually ends the hamfest season for EIDX members. Many of us enjoy the West Liberty hamfest. This hamfest has grown steadily over the last 7 or 8 years, and probably gets its popularity by being the last fling of the season. It is by far the friendliest hamfest I have attended. People spend as much time rag chewing with fellow hams as they do viewing the merchandise. West Liberty features a free outdoor flea mkt, V.E. exams, and a good mix of commercial dealers.

The West Liberty event did not end the hamfest season for me in 93. On October 30, my wife and I attended the St. Paul Minn, Hamfest. Although I broke my one main hamfest rule, (don't go if it takes you longer to get there than to view the fest), this one will be on my schedule for 94. It featured a large area of commercial vendors surrounded by a large flea mkt, all of this inside the St. Paul Civic Center. Several major manufactures were present; Icom, Ramsey, and Sommer Antennas. The commercial dealers included Burghardt Electronics, Satellite City, and several computer stores from the metro area. This hamfest is easy to reach (just off I-35 E) and about 10 miles from the Mega Mall. This makes a nice hamfest for you and the wife to take in. Hamfest in the morning, Mega Mall in the afternoon, and an evening on the town. Plan ahead, motel rooms fill up fast.
