Hello everyone and welcome to my first Vice President's column. I'm still recovering from a full knee replacement.



## A DX Blast from the past – Jerry Rappel WWØE

#### "Romeo, Romeo, where for art thou Romeo"?



Romeo Stepanenko 3W3RR/AHØM. The 1993 DXpedition to North Korea, P5RS7. The DX scene was in total hysteria at the start of 1993. The famous Romeo of past DX fame was signing P5RS7, supposedly from North Korea on 15 and 20 meter CW. This operation was never accredited for DXCC, and since, has become another blunder for the famous Romeo. Subsequently, Mr. Romeo's operation from

Libya, 5AØRR was also disallowed.

Romeo faked the North Korea operation and was caught cheating, like submitting pictures that were later identified as locations not in North Korea. Japanese amateurs using directional equipment verified that Romeo was in Vladivostok Russia, just over the border from North Korea. He was unanimously voted down and disqualified from the DXCC program and is not allowed to participate in any matter, because he cheated. Last heard he was a salesman somewhere in Asia. Unfortunately, when you cheat, you live with the consequences.

#### DX Marathon - Joe Hetrick KCØVKN

Doubtless everyone is probably tired of me spamming them on the reflector about Marathon totals and changes! For those who have been living on a rock in the middle of the Pacific (have you been QRV?), EIDXA is trying to drum up some participation with a little intra-club competition using the *CQ DX Marathon* as the excuse.

Probably the easiest way to get an understanding of what Marathon is, is to read the rules at: <a href="http://www.dxmarathon.com">http://www.dxmarathon.com</a>. As of this writing it was pretty straightforward (using the 2011 rules as a guideline).



#### Three categories:

- Unlimited (spotting, power, antennas)
- Formula 1 (QRP, single tower shorter than 65', or wire antennas)
- Formula 2 (100W max, simple verticals or wire antennas-no arrays or yagis)

See the rules for complete description, but this should get you started thinking where you'll operate.

Goal:

Work as many distinct DXCC entities/zones using any band or mode (excluding

Echolink/repeaters/satellites) beginning 0000 UTC January 1, 2011, ending 2359 UTC December 31, 2011. Each country and zone is counted only once, so, you just need to work on whatever bands/modes you can and work as many individual countries as you can!

No verification is required, the honor system is in effect.

Sounds pretty easy, eh? To track your progress, CQ has a spreadsheet available that you can use to fill in your slots. The site above should reference a link to that spreadsheet. I have a parser completed that will allow EIDXA members to email me their Excel files periodically so that I can generate club totals to display on a webpage. 
The guidelines for sending me your spreadsheets are pretty simple: make sure it's the current 2011 CQ Spreadsheet (which you can get from the above dxmarathon link). Other than that, I don't care if you email it to me once a day or once a week. You don't have to date it, or keep track of the differences between the last and the first submission. It would be slightly helpful if you named it "yourcall.xls" like "kc0vkn.xls".

I'm working on a second solution for those without excel; or without the desire to use it (I agree; using a big unwieldy spreadsheet is annoying). I've got a web-only interface in the works that will let you enter your zone and countries worked one at a time and it will then be incorporated into the totals page above. It will also generate a comma separated file that you can import into the CQ Spreadsheet, should you decide you want to enter the Marathon at the end of 2011 because you had such a great year of DX.


My hope and goal is that if I can provide regular updates to the membership about individual totals, people will be motivated to QRV and have fun. If you have ideas, I'd love to hear them.


