ARRL Midwest Division Director Wade Walstrom, WØEJ, SK



ARRL Midwest Division Director Wade Walstrom, WØEJ, who died August 31

NEWINGTON. CT, Sep 1, 2006 -- ARRL Midwest **Division Director** Robert W. "Wade" Walstrom, WØEJ. of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, died August 31 during surgery. He was 59. An ARRL Life and Diamond Club member, Walstrom was elected in 1999 to succeed

retiring Midwest Division Director Lew Gordon, K4VX. He won a third term (2006-2008) as Midwest Division Director last fall. Born in Nebraska and raised in South Dakota, he'd been an Amateur Radio licensee for 46 years and previously held the call signs KØZTV and WA6TXE.

"Wade's sudden and unexpected passing is deeply shocking to all of us who worked with him during his many years of service to the ARRL," said ARRL Chief Executive Officer David Sumner, K1ZZ.

A member of the ARRL Executive Committee, Walstrom -- an electrical engineer and recently retired Rockwell-Collins project manager -- was a former three-term lowa Section Manager before becoming Midwest Division Director. He'd previously chaired the ARRL Board of Directors' Volunteer Resources and Programs and Services committees, and he'd served on the Membership Services and Election and Ethics committees.

Walstrom was instrumental in the effort to end interference to Amateur Radio from a broadband over power line (BPL) pilot project in Cedar Rapids. He not only worked with local radio amateurs but coauthored a technical report that pointed out BPL's harmful interference in the amateur bands and the inadequacy of "notching" techniques. Copies of the report went to each member of the FCC.

Walstrom also served on the Linn County Planning and Zoning Commission.

An active and serious DXer and contester, Walstrom was a member of the Eastern Iowa DX Association, QCWA. AMSAT and the Cedar Valley Amateur Radio Club.

Walstrom was a

graduate of South Dakota State University. He received his PhD from Iowa State University.

ARRL First Vice President Kay Craigie, N3KN, worked with Walstrom on the Volunteer Resources Committee, which, in 2003, revised the rules and regulations governing the ARRL Field Organization.

"He could always find the right words when I got stuck for how to phrase something," Craigie recalled. "It was a pleasure to work with him, and I am very sad that there won't be any more

opportunities for us to benefit from his intelligence and good sense."

ARRL Hudson Division Director Frank Fallon, N2FF, said he was shocked and saddened to learn of Walstrom's untimely death. "I had the good fortune to get to know this quite bright man pretty well, sitting next to him at meetings and working with him on committees. He was a very fair and intelligent individual. I think I can speak for all of us on the Board when I say we admired him and the values he stood for."

ARRL Midwest Division Vice Director Bruce Frahm, KØBJ, has succeeded Walstrom as the division's Director. ARRL President Joel Harrison, W5ZN, will appoint someone to fill the now-vacant Vice Director's seat.

Survivors include Walstrom's wife, Solveig, and their sons Robert and Steve, KCØLGE. Visitation is Monday, September 4, 2-5 PM, at Cedar Memorial Funeral Home in Cedar Rapids. Members of the ARRL Board of Directors will attend the memorial service Tuesday, September 5, 10 AM, at St. Mark's Lutheran Church in Cedar Rapids.

The family invites memorial donations to the ARRL or to St Mark's Lutheran Church.

[Notes from the Editor – I was part of a group of local amateurs that participated in Wade's funeral mass. What an amazing experience! Wade was remembered in a way that paid tribute to him and his life. It was scripted to tell his life as a tribute to the man. At the April meeting I had the pleasure to present my exploits as FG/N0YY for the ARRL International DX CW Contest. While I enjoyed the contest, I left feeling like I had missed a part of the experience. I fell short of my goal of "winning" or so I thought.

This short note tells its own story – one of effort, skill (at least I'd like to think there was some skill involved) and competition.

After every contest there is a posting of scores on the 3830 reflector to establish bragging rights or to just see how you stacked up against regional competition or your own goals. I had selected the Low Power, Unassisted class because it fit with my desire to not have to drag tons of equipment to the Caribbean and to compare operating skills among those in the same class.

As scores started to pour in, I was encouraged in that my score was still on the top of the pile, but that was short lived. AE6Y operating from P49Y changed classes and with the luck of propagation, skill, and timing wound up with the top score. Well second in the world ain't all that bad – is it?

And then just days before the end of the contest reporting period, Dave, K3LP posted his score from FS5UQ and sure enough my "second in the world" fell to third.

Well now it was time to start a training regime. Stay up longer. More pileup practice. Develop a better band change strategy. And schedule a return visit to push the envelope. Yes, I continued to improve in my Kansas City DX Club hospitality suite Pile Up Contest CW test

moving up another few notches from last year.

But to me the most important was to wait for the Log Checking Report from ARRL and to see where my mistakes were made. Was it during high rate periods? Low band operations? Noisy periods?

Well the ubiquitous Yogi Berra said it well when he intoned, "...It ain't over till the fat lady sings..." When the ARRL results came out, I was back in second place. I passed Dave by a more accurate log. There is no claim to skill or conditions, or anything else – only the conclusion that after busted calls and multipliers were removed, I would up second in the world.

It was quite interesting to see that the ARRL Contest report in QST actually added space to identify that the difference in score between Dave and me "...were separated by less than a tenth of a percentage point." Wow – that's close!

When you think in terms of busted calls and the penalties, then the actual number of miscopied/mislogged calls was about 16 calls out of 3500! I declare that a personal success!!!

As a result of the rescoring, and the World Second Place result – I also found that the consolation prize was that I was

the top scoring North American Low Power Single Operator Unassisted – thus being able to put some hardware on the wall!!!! Quite a pleasant surprise.

So spoils to the good clean living and dedication. And the realization that accuracy can beat raw rate in a contest. Needless to say I am quite pleased.

So now... What to do this next contest season?????
