I'm sure most of us are pretty familiar with reading HF propagation forcasts, but with the numbers so bad I thought this reprint from KQ6XA might be of interest:

KQ6XA RULE OF THUMB for How To Read HF Propagation Numbers.

The A index = LOW is GOOD. 1 to 6 is BEST 7 to 9 is OK 11 or more is BAD

SFI index: HIGH is GOOD. 70 NOT GOOD 80 GOOD 90 BETTER 100+ BEST

K index: LOW is GOOD.
0 or 1 is BEST
2 is OK
3 or more is BAD
5 is VERY VERY BAD

A low "A index" is most important! For Low Power Portable DX openings at 10MHz to 30MHz, look for an A index LESS THAN 6.

....NØSM reports on the QSL Bureau project:

At the last meeting, the suggestion was made that club members pool their QSLcards to the outgoing bureau. After checking, this is possible and allowed. Here is the information for doing that:

- 1. The cost will be 10 cents per card.
- 2. Cards will need to have the call of the receiving station printed in LARGE letters in the upper left hand corner on the back of each card.
- 3. Cards must be in alphabetic order according to country with the exceptions of those cards using special designators for a given country (i.e. 6E (Mexico) cards go with XE cards, etc).
- 4. There are approximately 225 countries served by the ARRL. Please remember to check the list of countries not served by the outgoing bureau (listed later in the newsletter). Do be aware that some countries require receiving stations to be members of their radio society to receive incoming cards. Those, too, are listed later in the newsletter.
- 5. The outgoing bureau requires proof of ARRL membership. We're not certain if certification by the club secretary will suffice so please bring along a photocopy of the label on your QST.
- 6. Steve will send them out two weeks after each EIDXA meeting. He will pickup what he can at the meeting but if you do not make it to the meeting, please send them to N0SM at the QRZ.com address.

The following is a recap some of Dave KJ9I regarding ways of communicating within the club.

To use the e-mail reflector as a way to share info, send to the following: EIDXA@mailman.qth.net with an appropriate DX related subject line. Poof: real-time DX information at all of our finger-tips within seconds of it being sent.

How do I get my e-mail address added to or removed from the EIDXA reflector? Contact our club secretary with specifics (your e-mail address) and the request (add or remove) to/from list.

How do I access the EIDXA website? Open your internet connection and your web browser (Mozilla Firefox or Microsoft Explorer, etc.) and input http://www.eidxa.org/ as the URL. Hit enter to send your browser to this site. Presto: you're there! Now navigate to the links on the web to explore that which you're interested in seeing real-time, whenever your schedule permits on-demand.
